Make your Deepawali special by sharing your happiness with others who do not have the means to enjoy.

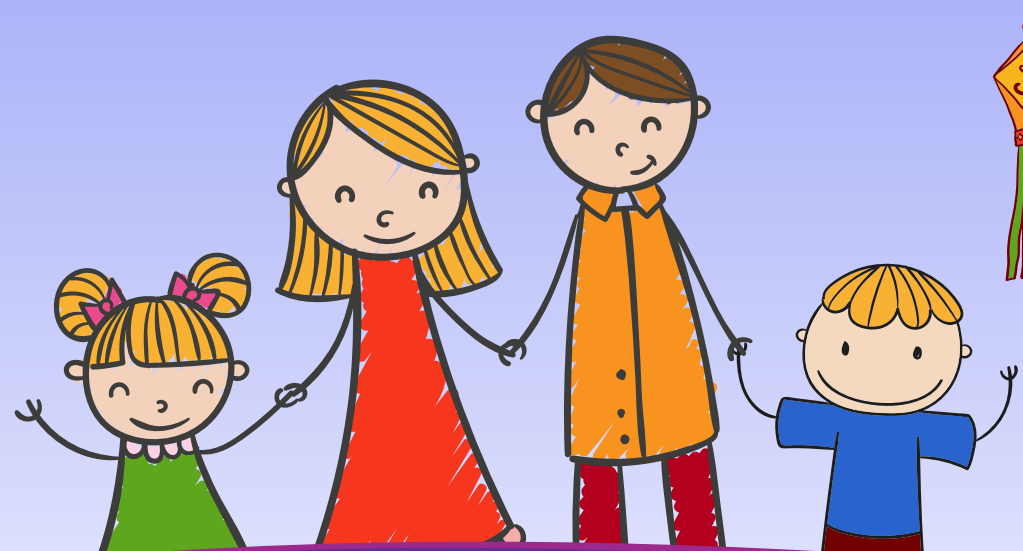
Parent's Corner

I'm in school every day.

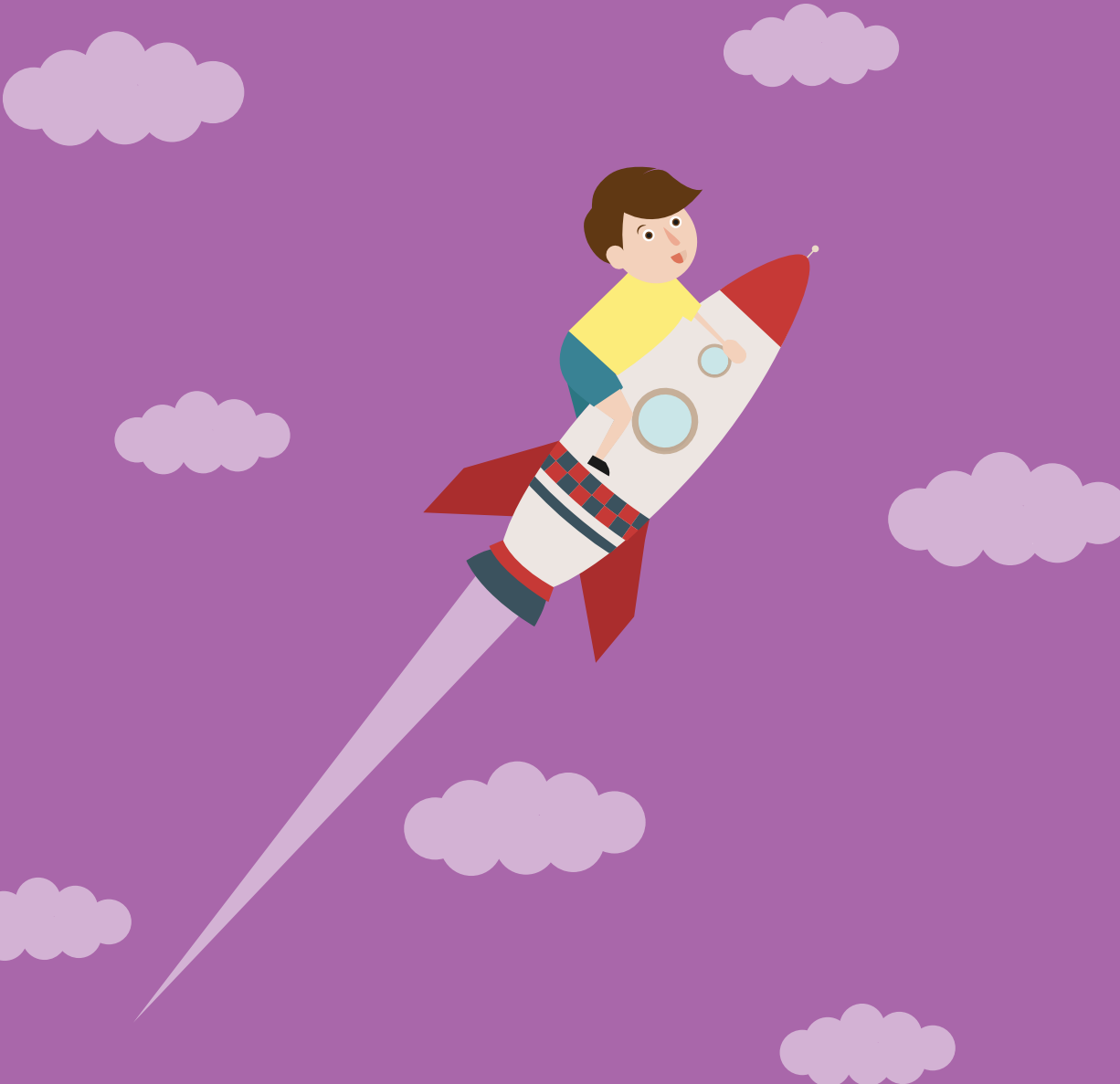
My teachers think I'm average;
